

Cadets' poster captures 'abuse' contest

As part of a study of drug, alcohol, and tobacco abuse in the country, a poster contest was conducted Jan. 29 at Carson Long Institute in New Bloomfield.

The students involved in the contest were members of Karen McVitty's freshman health class. Mrs. McVitty is one of the two school nurses.

She said the material studied in the class inspired the boys to hold the poster contest. The message of the posters was, "Don't abuse drugs, alcohol, and tobacco."
